About Lindström's City Government

<u>Lindström's City Government</u> is comprised of an elected City Council, elected Mayor, appointed Commissioners, and is structured as a statutory city. Most Minnesota cities are incorporated as a statutory city. The Legislature has proved three "plans" or forms of organization for statutory cities: the Standard Plan, Optional Plan A, and Optional Plan B.

Lindström is structured utilizing Optional Plan A, which is a modification of the Standard Plan. It retains the weak mayor-council characteristics, but provides for an appointed clerk, an appointed treasurer (or a combined clerk-treasurer), a mayor, and four or six council members. The <u>Lindström City Council</u>, composed of four elected Council Members and an elected Mayor, is the Governmental body that oversees the operation of the City. Two of the Council members are elected each even-numbered year and serve a four-year term. The Mayor serves a two-year term. The Council meets on the third Thursday of each month, beginning at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers of City Hall, 13292 Sylvan Ave, Lindström.

What is Lindström's Comprehensive Plan?

The Comprehensive Plan is a blueprint for the future of Lindström; guiding the use of every parcel of land, both public and private, throughout the City. This includes making land use decisions, preparing and implementing ordinances, preparing capital improvement programs, and influencing the rate, timing, and location of future growth. Introducing Lindström's City Council

Meet our 2023 Lindström City Council!

At the **2022 General Election** in November, two new Members were elected to the Lindström City Council (4-year terms), and Mayor Kevin Stenson was re-elected as Mayor of the City of Lindström (2-year term). Their terms begin in January of 2023.

Kevin Stenson, Mayor (2023-2024, 2021-2022, 2019-2020)



Mayor Stenson will serve his third term as the Mayor of the City of Lindström beginning in 2023 after taking an Oath of Office.

He previously served as a Lindström City Council Member, and was Chief of Police of the Lakes Area Police Department for 25 years. Laurie Burington, Council Member (2021-2024, 2019-2020)



Member Burington began her first 4-year term as a City Council Member in 2021, and served as a City Council Member in 2019 and in 2020.

She previously served as a Lindström Planning Commissioner.

Linda Merkel, Council Member (2021-2024)



Member Merkel began her first 4-year term as a City Council Member in 2021.

Judy Chartrand, Council Member (2023-2026)



Member Chartrand will serve her first term as a City Council Member beginning in January of 2023 after taking an Oath of Office.

She previously served as a Lindström Park Commission Member as well as a Lindström Planning Commission Member.

Brian Norelius, Council Member (2023-2026)



Member Norelius will serve his first term as a City Council Member beginning in January of 2023 after taking an Oath of Office.

Lindström's City Administrator Resigns

The City Administrator for Lindström, John Olinger, recently chose to resign, effective at the end of 2022. John stated that he had been sensing a need for a change for quite awhile.

Olinger explained that this will allow the next City Council to set a new course with new leadership. He stated that "this city has been very good to us (him and his wife), and we appreciate that we have had 17 years. We love this community, our kids grew up here, some now live in the community, and we plan to continue to live here. Thank you so much for the years we have been able to serve you. This is truly a "Great Place"."

John commented that he is going to

take some time to contemplate his next steps.

What does this mean for the city?

The new City Council will be sworn in at the City Council Annual Meeting on January 4, 2023. The process for hiring a new City Administrator, whether or not to designate a Lindström City Staff person as the acting City Administrator, and a plethora of other details will likely be decided upon at the regular City Council meeting on January 19th, unless a Special City Council Meeting is set for this purpose.

In the meantime and in the months to come, City Staff and City Council will

be working together to fill the gap in leadership and take on the responsibilities of this position. Hiring a new City Administrator that is well-qualified and a good fit for a particular city can be a lengthy process. We ask for your patience during this time of transition.

A note to John from City Staff:

It has been a pleasure to work with you. Your passion for people over things, kindness in the midst of challenges, and dedication to us and this city is commendable. We greatly appreciate you and your leadership. Thank you for all you have done, and we wish you a bright and rewarding future.



Snowmobiling

There are many trails in the area for snow-mobiling, which are primarily groomed and maintained by members of the <u>Wild River Snowmobile Club</u>. Depending upon conditions, the trail may open later in the season than anticipated, and could also close temporarily after being opened for the season.

Please respect private property so we can keep the trails that we have. This includes staying on the trail at all times, as well as not utilizing the trails when private land owners have closed the trail gates. We rely ENTIRELY on private landowners for our trail system. Thank them by not trespassing.

All non-portable ice shelters must be licensed. A portable shelter is defined as a shelter that collapses, folds or is disassembled for transportation. Ice Safety

White ice or "snow ice" is only about half as strong as new clear ice. Double the below thickness guidelines when traveling on white ice.



Temperature, snow cover, currents, springs, and rough fish all affect the relative safety of ice. Ice is seldom the same thickness over a single body of water; make sure to check the ice at least every 150 feet. For more information, please visit the MN DNR's website:

City Projects & Development Updates

Elms Estates: The utilities are cut off. Only one trailer remains and will be demolished when the weather warms up. The property is privately owned (**not** city-owned), and clearing and clean up of the property continues.

Golf Estates: Twelve homes are under construction, with one home occupied.

Lindstrom Fire Hall: Construction continues. Completion has been pushed back to 2023.

Lindstrom Police Hall: Preparations are being made for next year's bonding bill. Our lobbyist is in place and the project is still on with Minnesota's Management and Budget (MMB) office. We await next steps.

Maple Street: The City Engineer conducted a traffic study for Maple Street. Another neighborhood meeting will be scheduled in the Spring of 2023 to discuss the findings of the study.

Meredees/Peninsula: The developer did not meet the deadline to file the final plat.

Morning Sun Phase 4: The project is on hold for the winter.

Newlander/Elm Street Reconstruction: The project is complete for this year. The erosion control blankets on steeply graded areas and the dormant seed has been installed by the contractor. A few of the erosion control devices were left in place to protect from a quick thaw. The rain garden and punch list items will be addressed next year. To learn more about this project, click <u>HERE</u>.

O'Jay Juice Factory: <u>DEED</u> awarded the City \$200,000 in Redevelopment Grant funds and the Chisago County EDA/HRA has committed to a 50/50 partnership up to \$300,000 for the purchase and demolition of the site. Staff met with the owner's representative and have made a preliminary agreement. The City Attorney is drafting a purchase agreement for the EDA and City Council to consider. If all is agreed upon, we hope to close in January 2023. Staff met with three potential land buyers with projects who are considering the site.

Park Street Parking Lot Utility Undergrounding: The survey is complete. The City Engineer is designing a plan for City Council consideration and public comment.

Twin Oaks/Lyman Court Phase Two: The project is on hold for the winter.

Veteran's Housing (Tingsryd Gardens): The preliminary plat has been approved but the project has been put on hold until 2023.



Disposal of real Christmas trees varies. Check with your refuse/ garbage hauler. Some haulers do not take them, and some will take them for a small fee. The Area Compost Site that serves City of Lindström residents is not open in the

winter. The privately run waste transfer station, SRC in Wyoming, MN accepts trees for a fee: 651-462-5298.

If incomplete or broken, place in the garbage. Please contact your desired location to ensure their policy has not changed.

City Wide Tree & Shrub Trimming On All Plow Routes

Several areas along city streets are becoming overgrown with trees and shrubs. Not only does this cause a hazard by obstructing visibility for drivers, cyclists, and pedestrians, but it is also problematic for snow plows and emergency vehicles.

The City of Lindström will be trimming trees and shrubs that are within the road right-of-way (ROW) to increase safety and to help minimize damage to plowing and emergency equipment. This project started in late September, and is anticipated to be completed for the season in mid-December. We will only trim what is needed.

What is a Road Right-Of-Way?

Definition

Right-of-way is a legal right of passage that allows someone the right to travel across property owned by someone else.

Land within the right-of-way is reserved for public use. This may be used for public streets, sidewalks, alleys, public and private utilities, etc. Right-of-way width varies by location. A typical residential street has a right-of-way width of approximately 60 feet.

§ 90.23 TREES AND OTHER VEGETATIVE PLANTINGS IN CITY RIGHTS-OF-WAY AND EASEMENT AREAS.

- (A) Planting trees or other vegetation in the boulevard (street right-of-way) is not allowed without a permit from the city. Trees and other vegetation planted within city rights-of-way shall be maintained by the city.
- (B) The city may plant or maintain trees and other vegetation in city rights-of-way and may assess the abutting property for any benefit or costs associated with the planting, maintenance or removal of the tree or other vegetation, whether planted by the city or the property owner.
- (C) Trees and other vegetation may be planted and maintained in drainage and utility easements without a permit from the city at the risk of the property owner and provided that the trees or vegetation do not inter-

fere with access to or use of the easement.



Example of a Road Right-of-Way (ROW):

What to do if your plantings are in the road right-of-way (ROW):

- Relocate your plantings to an area of your yard that is not in the ROW.
- If you choose to keep your plantings in the ROW, be aware that they may trimmed or removed. Utility companies, as well as the City of Lindström, have the right to do so in the ROW, without compensating or notifying the property owner or tenant.
- Keep your neighborhood safer by keeping your trees and shrubs trimmed.

Right-of-Way Planting

The City of Lindström prohibits planting of trees or other vegetation in the boulevard (road right-of-way). Trees and other vegetation may be planted and maintained in drainage and utility easements without a permit from the city at the risk of the property owner and provided that the trees or vegetation do not interfere with access to or use of the easement. (Ordinance 90.23)







Winter Parking

• From November 1st to April 15th there is **NO PARKING** allowed on city streets between the hours of 2:00 am and 6:00 am or during snow events. This allows our crew to be able to plow in front of your house without having to plow around your vehicles.



- During a snow event, please avoid parking on city streets until the plows have cleared the road.
- If you live in downtown and use the city-owned Park Street Parking Lot for parking, you will need to obtain a winter parking pass. Please contact the <u>Lakes Area Police Department</u> for more information using their non-emergency number 651-257-0622 or stop in at <u>City Hall</u>.

Protect Your Mailbox

- Mailboxes that protrude into the street are hard to avoid when snowplowing. Please
 make sure that your mailbox is the appropriate distance from the curb. Click <u>HERE</u>
 for specific USPS mailbox requirements and measurements.
- Most mailbox damage occurs from the weight of the snow- not from being hit by the plow blade. Consider replacing your mailbox with a swing style post.



Snow Plowing

- If your lot is curved, please place reflective markers near the curb to help guide the snowplows.
- DO NOT plow or shovel snow across streets or into a Right of Way. This is referred to as <u>"snow-pushing"</u> and it is **illegal.**
- Any personal property located within the Right of Way, including garbage cans, are subject to plowing damage. *Garbage cans need to be placed in the driveway, not in the street.*

Snow Plow Safety Tips

Driving too close to snow removal equipment can be extremely dangerous. Follow at a safe distance (at least 5 car lengths away), yield to snowplows, never drive into a snow cloud, and do not use cruise control on wet or icy roads. Avoid passing snowplows, and be patient. Plows travel slower than posted speeds. Stay alert—a snowplow weighs 17 times more than a car! Assume plow truck drivers cannot see you. During a snow event, please avoid parking on city streets until the plows have cleared the road.

Keep Your Fire Hydrant Cleared

If you have a fire hydrant in your yard, please keep a 3-foot path cleared of snow around the hydrant, clear the hydrant of ice and snow, and keep a path shoveled from the hydrant to the street- and is the responsibility of the Property Owner.

Firefighters need to be able to **locate AND access** the fire hydrant quickly in case there is an emergency. Do your part and reveal the red. *Thank you!*



Winter Shoveling

- **Property owners** are responsible to clear the sidewalks adjacent to their property of snow and ice **within 24 hours** of a snowfall event. For the benefit and safety of all pedestrians, please adhere to this **City Ordinance** (Ordinances 93.01 & 93.18).
- Help your neighbors out, especially if you know they are gone or are elderly. Consider clearing their sidewalks & driveways.

Snowmobiles, ATV's & Golf Carts

- Snowmobiles, ATV's and golf carts are not allowed to travel on sidewalks, in city parks, or on private property without permission. Click **HERE** for complete City Ordinance information.
- Snowmobiles, ATV's and golf carts may operate upon the most right-hand lane of a municipal street
 or alley & may, in passing or making a left turn, operate on other lanes which are used for vehicle
 traffic in the same direction for purposes of going to or returning from a non-highway area of
 permissible operation by the most direct route.
- Snowmobiles, ATV's and golf carts shall only be allowed to travel on City Streets during the winter season, beginning November 1st through March 31st of each year.
